

May I cite this work? – Yes, if ...

Citation right

... the right to citation can be applied

Is there a purpose of citation? Is there a connection between the citation and your own work?



Did you explain the connection between both works?



Is the length of the citations appropriate? Did you cite only as much as necessary?



Did you mark and reference the citation clearly?



Copyright-free

... the work is in the public domain



Is it a work that doesn't meet the threshold of originality?

or

Has the copyright protection already expired?

or

Is the work marked as in the public domain?

Permission

... you have a permission from the copyright holder



Is a corresponding license granted?

Do you have permission from the copyright holder?

What if ...

...the source hasn't been published?

... the citation is an image you want to change?

... you want to merge information from different sources into a table or figure? Then you obtain permission from the copyright holder to cite the work.

Then you get permission to modify the work. Alternatively, create your own image and name the source on which your image is based.

Then you create a new table or image and indicate which information comes from which source.
